Chief Diplomat	<ul> <li>Sets overall foreign policy</li> <li>Appoints ambassadors</li> <li>Negotiates both treaties and executive agreements</li> <li>Gives diplomatic recognition to foreign governments</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Congress appropriates funds for foreign affairs</li> <li>Senate can reject ambassadors and treaties</li> </ul>
Chief of State	The ceremonial head of our nation (e.g., tosses out the first ball of the baseball season, visits the areas struck by natural disaster)	
Chief Jurist	<ul> <li>Appoints federal judges</li> <li>Issues pardons (e.g., Ford pardoned Nixon for Watergate) and amnesty</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Senate can reject judicial appointments</li> <li>Senators can place "holds" on appointments</li> <li>Senators can filibuster nominations</li> </ul>
